SurreyCares has had a fantastic year of growth through 2016.

With our strategic focus on capacity building, we were pleased to see progress both financially, and in community relationships.

The year saw us reconnect with many "Friends of SurreyCares" in an informative and informal reception.

Moving forward, our strategic focus continues to be on building capacity in order to serve. Our ultimate goal is to increase the amount of money granted out to the community. We realize that this will be achieved with appropriate human and financial resources.

I am very pleased, therefore, to have welcomed three

members to the Board of Directors in 2016, who bring diverse skills and proven Board experience. Office capacity has also grown, as the Executive Director notes in her report.

From the Treasurer

The year ending 2016 showed an increase in the funds that we manage for our endowment fund holders to roughly \$6,087,000 in capital (\$195,000 in the income fund). This increase came about both by donations and by adding a portion of their interest earned back into the capital fund. Fund holders also were able to grant out from their endowments funds.

The fair market value of the investments held is roughly \$6,869,000 with roughly a \$700,000 unrealized capital gain.

Spotlight on a Grant Recipient

Zajac Ranch Society



In the summer months, Zajac Ranch for Children provides camps for children and young adults with chronic, life-threatening and/or debilitating conditions. These experiences give participants the opportunity to explore the outdoors while developing greater social and environmental awareness, increased self-confidence and positive growth in attitudes towards physical activity.

Zajac Ranch welcomes children and young adults with a variety of medical conditions and disabilities to our summer medical camps from June to August.

All year long, Hayley is accompanied almost everywhere because her seizures are not well controlled. When she is at camp, she feels independent and stronger, able to try new things and stretch herself.

Hayley was really scared of climbing the rock wall and it took her a long time, but she made it halfway up and was proud of herself. Camp is really the highlight of her summer and it has made her more confident

and boosted her self-esteem. We can't thank you, your sponsors, partners and donors enough.

Where does this grant money come from?

SurreyCares manages a permanent collection of endowed funds, the earnings of which are used for the long-term benefit of our community, in perpetuity.

How endowment funds work for your organization

Grants to community.

A fund is established by a philanthropist, or a fundraising campaign (for example) for the general good of the community. The interest from the fund is granted out according to the wishes of the benefactor/s. This may be directed to area of greatest need, youth, education, health, or another charitable purpose meaningful to the donor.

A funding tool for your organization.

A charitable organization starts a self-directed endowment fund, with all earned interest going towards their greatest need. This can be a great fundraising tool, attracting donors who prefer to fund sustainability.

Create a legacy fund

Whether you want to address an urgent need in the community, support the memory of a loved one, or help out a charity with a project, we have a giving option to help you make an impact and improve the lives of others.

Fundraising online

In 2016, SurreyCares partnered with 2MEvents to allow easy donations directly to each fund. In addition, fund holders can easily create a crowd funding campaign, with all funds going directly to their account. Goals can be set for the campaign and progress followed. Tax receipts are automatically issued.

Vital Signs: Grant applications should address gaps identified in the most recently published Surrey Vital Signs report. (Oct 2016: Newcomers)

Community: Programs that address general community needs.

Youth: Programs that address the needs of youth in Surrey.

Special Needs: This includes health and personal needs projects.

SurreyCares has granted out over \$1,000,000 to our community!

Our Grants Committee is comprised of a team of skilled volunteers who score each application individually, based on the merits of the application, and on how the project fits our annual criteria.

She has found a 'sameness' in others, which has helped her approach life with new confidence, and has allowed her to accept her differences with gratitude and pride. She has also been able to come to terms with her own medical challenges (not cancer-related) because she knows that she is not judged by other kids or staff while at camp - something she doesn't always experience in the 'real world.' 

Surrey's North Ridge Elementary school announced today the establishment of the "Manjit Panghali Memorial Fund" with the Surrey Foundation to provide an annual scholarship to a graduating student who attended North Ridge.

The scholarship fund was created in memory of Manjit Panghali, a Surrey School District teacher whose life tragically ended in October 2006. The memorial fund was initiated by Carolyn Convey, a colleague who taught a Grade 1 class with Manjit at North Ridge Elementary.



Wil and Cherry

Cherry and Wil moved to South Surrey from Richmond in 2012. Both were attracted by the green spaces and the slower pace of life. Wil is a professional in the high-tech industry. He has a longer commute to work, but says the move was worth it because he likes where he now lives.

Saving for a Home of Their Own

Cherry says people are friendlier and more inclined to talk. Finding a rental home for their young family was difficult, as many places are for the over-55 age group. They are saving for a home but are concerned about affordability. "Though we like it here, we may end up moving to find a house," she says. Both say neighbours and the community have been welcoming. Cherry, a stay-at-home mom with two young children, says grandparents babysit when they are able to visit Canada.

Otherwise, due to cost, daycare is not an option.

Cherry wants to take courses, but transit, daycare, and waitlists for programs are all obstacles. "Safety is an issue. . . . In Surrey, there are areas you don't want to visit in the evening."

Safety Matters to This Young Family

The family uses the local recreation centre and looks forward to using facilities more as their children get older. They feel there is more crime in Surrey than there was in Richmond. After their building was broken into, Wil joined Block Watch, the neighbourhood crime prevention program. They take the children to parks and playgrounds in the daytime. In the evenings, they don't find Surrey is as safe. Despite that, overall, the couple says their move was positive and they enjoy their life in Surrey.

Vital Signs Researchers

We are grateful to Surrey universities, and our close partnerships that have provided supervised graduate students to conduct research.

Simon Fraser University has been a strong partner from the inception of Surrey's Vital Signs, and we are thrilled to continue this partnership.

In late 2016, Kwantlen Polytechnic (KPU) and SurreyCares strengthened our partnership as we formed the community Advisory and began the pre-work for yhe 2017 First Peoples Vital Signs.


